

Attracted to Drama at Oakton High

For Herman, the musical, "Little Women," will be her final production, but for Gelinas, the musical is the beginning of her career as full-time

theater director.

For the past four years, Herman has worked closely with Gelinas.


Although this is Gelinas' first year as a full-time teacher, Herman has worked with her in past productions and the two have become much closer throughout the course of the past year.

"I feel like Ms. Gelinas really understands who I am not only as an actress but also as a person," Herman said. "I learned a lot from just watching Ms. Gelinas direct us. I really benefited this year from having her as well, because we have worked on skills that will help us later on like resume head shots, auditioning skills and working on the shows altogether."

Before Gelinas took over at the beginning of the school year as full-time director, former drama teacher Skip Bromley was the head of the drama department. While Bromley brought important skills to the department, Gelinas offers something different.

"She has a lot of great publicity ideas, and she has worked a lot more in the professional theater than Mr. Bromley," Herman said. "She has a lot of knowledge about sibility and dedication to the the business right now.

FOR HERMAN, the knowledge she has gained about the business as a whole is imperative to her future career choice. Herman will be attending James Madison Uni-

versity in the fall where she will study theater, and hopes to work in theater after graduation.

"I would have discovered my love for theater at any school I went to, but I wouldn't have had as many opportunities if I hadn't gone to Oakton," Herman said. "If I wasn't given the opportunity to be cast all of the time and work backstage also, I wouldn't have gotten the whole picture."

Gelinas said she thinks Herman will be successful in her future career choice. Over the past year, Herman has demonstrated respondrama department as a whole.

"She is such a hardworking person in every aspect," Gelinas said. "For example, for this show, she is in my seventh period tech class painting the sets, she is in drama class working on scenes and she

is rehearsing after school. She is involved in every aspect and she loves every aspect of theater."

Herman and Gelinas have worked closely together throughout the year in making the transition from Bromley to a new musical director and in expanding Oakton's theater department.

"I didn't want it to be a huge change because the theater department works really well," Gelinas said. "We did join Cappies this year for the first time, and Amanda played a large role in starting that. She got our critics team organized, and a lot of their reviews have been published."

FOR GELINAS, the biggest adjustment has been time management. Herman has served as a stabilizing figure while Gelinas attempts to balance all of the many components that go into putting on a musical.

"Amanda has one of those memories where you ask her to do something, and the next thing you know she will show up and already have it done," Gelinas said. "I hope the younger kids see how hard she works and will follow her ex-
